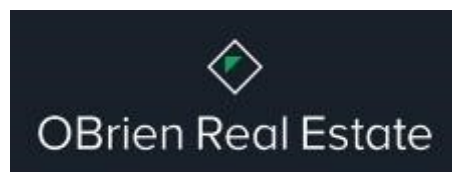

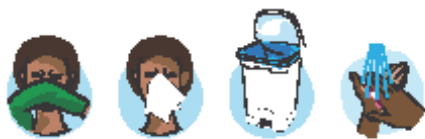
Official Advice from the World Health Organisation to help stop the spread of Coronavirus (COVID19).
