Our Life in Coronavirus World - Roger and Lyn Annear

What a way to spend a year after 6 enjoyable weeks of 2019 in South America and plans to return there in 2020. In February Rog had some good flight deals ready to book but decided to hold off for a few weeks. How lucky was that! But then how sad that we are unable to see our son Joshua and family now locked down in Lima, Peru. Skype and Duo phone calls are not the same as personal touch and greetings and it looks like it will be another year before we are able to see them again. Likewise it was hard not to see Ben and his family only 3 hours away and preventing us from enjoying our grandson going from crawling to walking and now communicating and reacting to his surrounds.

Lyn has been keeping herself busy during shutdown with plenty of walks, gathering photos of Mt Martha to send to Peru, finishing many craft and embroidery projects and looking after me. Missing her Monday golf and coffee friends and not being able to conduct her Thursday embroidery classes. More recently she has been getting the gardens back in shape with not a lot of help from me.

I on the other hand have continued to work three mornings a week but have missed my weekly golf games and the contribution to my community through the conviviality and friendship of our Rotary Club. After some legendary twenty plus years foregoing my annual mates Mallacoota fishing trip was a big miss. What a disaster for that community. We will return!

However a period of medical problems soon took over what I was missing. It began in June with some growth removals including one on the left shin with lots of stiches, then infection set in. By the end of August this was almost healed up but I was back in hospital with blocked arterial stents in the lower right leg. Sunday August 23 was big, time for an arterial bypass. This involved the removal of old stents and finding enough veins to use to bypass the blocked arteries. In the op theatre at 9:00am the next I knew it was 7:00pm. What a difficult time for all, Covid rampant in the community, Lyn and family not allowed to visit, waiting for the surgeons phone call (he did say it might take a couple of hours). More wound infections, twice weekly visits to the clinic for dressings and then in November more growth removals from the left shin. Ahhh when will it all end? All the stiches and bandages are now gone. Just a few scabby bits to look after and with luck by 2021 the current medical issues will be over. What next?

A week in hospital saw BUPA payout \$40,000 plus, thank goodness for healthcare in Australia. I could not have wished for better care. Far be it for me to complain about private health care costs. What a way to take your mind off the virus scare.

Now back into golf, grass mowing, car washing and we have been to visit Ben and family at Merrijig. Then last week Lyn met with her embroidery group and we had 14 month old grandson Oliver stay overnight. What relief and pleasure as some form of normality returns. I have been fortunate to have had Lyn by my side for not just last the last six months of looking after me health wise which I am very grateful for but for the 52 years we have stood together. We look forward to more time with family and friends in 2021.



WHAT ROLE PROGRAMS?

Programs is an important role in the life of a Rotary club. It is often the main way that clubs interact with the broader community and Rotary.

Clubs use the program schedule to facilitate collaboration with community groups. Often community groups will offer guest speakers as a part of their outreach program.

Community groups will often present to a Rotary club and some sort of involvement between the two

organisations develops, other times they do not. The tension for clubs is to allow community groups to speak to the club to broaden our knowledge of service in the community, but not to allow organisations who are simply looking for donations, seeking a market, self-promotion, or even credibility.

Though Rotary is not a political organisation and sees itself as politically agnostic, many worthy community groups take a political stand to benefit the achievement of their community work.

The club recently hosted the "Friends of Westernport" group who are campaigning against the proposed AGL floating gas terminal off Crib Point. By its nature, the campaign has won political support and then becomes political. Does this mean that we should not have had the speaker from Friends of Westernport?

It is common for a Rotary club to invite local politicians as a guest speaker. The Federal member for Flinders and the State member of Mornington have both supported our club in the past. Many clubs within our cluster invite a newly elected local member to speak and build a relationship to further our community interests.

The purpose of Programs is to:

- · educate members
- entertain members
- · sustain club attendance
- · support the club's program to do good in the world
- · improve Rotary knowledge
- collaborate with other Rotary clubs
- · collaborate with community groups
- collaborate with the club's geographical community

So as Programs Director, my question is: Is there any reason why a request to speak to our club should be denied? If so on what grounds would that denial be and then how should we deal with it? Another question might be: Are we prepared to expose ourselves to views that we may not have considered, or that we pre-judge as inappropriate content?

If we decided that there are no grounds upon which we deny a potential speaker, should we have a set of guidelines given to speakers, and what would those guidelines contain?

If you have a view on the three questions above, please let me know your thoughts, I will take submissions up to Dec 31^{st} and produce a summary for the club
