How and why I joined Rotary and why I stayed - Ray Martin

For most of my adult life I have enjoyed being involved with other people and, where needed, giving a helping hand.

I have served on many pre-school and school committees and attended too many working bees. I was Chairman of a committee assisting children with physical and mental difficulties and was lucky enough to raise sufficient funds to install a hydrotherapy pool at their special school. I worked as an honorary probation officer and was president of the Berwick Chamber of commerce and member of the Audit & Ethics committee for the City of Casey.

In the early 1990s I owned an Art Supplies Store and had sponsored the Rotary Club of Berwick's annual Art Show on many occasions. In 1992 I was asked by the Rotarian seeking my continued support if I would like to become a Rotarian. My decision was one of the best I have ever made.

I became a Rotarian in 1992 went on to become President then District Governor, I served on many District 9820 committees including Chairman of the Rotary Foundation introducing the new Foundation "Future Vision" model in 2013/4, and served as Chairman of the Australian Rotary National Insurance Committee

In 2010 I led a Team to India to participate in the National Immunization Day (NID). (Note: 90 million children were immunized that day.) This let me see the ravages and results of Polio, heartbreaking but this strengthened my resolve to continue to try and make a difference.

Along the way I picked up a few awards: Citizen of the Year for the City of Casey, Commonwealth Government Centenary Medal, a number or PHFs and Rotary Foundation Awards but they all pale by comparison with the friends I have made, the difference I hope I have made and the opportunities that Rotary has provided to me.

This is why I stay in ROTARY but why did I join?

I joined Rotary because somebody asked me ...

Rob Marks pointed this out the other day at a Membership Committee gathering. Most people join Rotary because somebody asks them.

Not ... many ... people ... wake up one day and say to themselves, ... "I think I'll join Rotary today"!

One of the strengths of Rotary is that we are all different ... every single one of us ... just think about it for a moment ...

We've all got different skills to contribute and we each have unique life stories to tell.

- An ex bank manager and PDG, with the statistical knowledge of a Bruce McAvaney, always available for advice.
- An ex copper who ... it seemed, just quietly rose up the District ranks to have a fantastic year as District Governor ... and continues to give in a wider Rotary capacity.
- The wise one, compassionate and deep thinker.
- The ex florist now sly grog operator, who is solid as rock.
- The accountant who's given so much to this club and the Rotary District over so many years.
- There's a helicopter pilot who brings his engineering skills to dismantle playgrounds and, more importantly, standardise a process that enables people in a different country, speaking a different language, to put them back together again.
- A financial planner who, God only knows how, and I say that advisedly, manages to compartmentalise his extremely busy life in a number of areas, to give time to Rotary.
- An Aged Care executive who brings care and empathy combined with her business skills.
- The tooth fairy that brings a smile to all his patients.
- The former Post Master, real estate and Body Corporate manager, who guides us with insightful common sense.

I could go on ... I'm sorry you've missed out ... but you get my drift.

This ... is ... fundamental to what Rotary was all about when it was founded by Paul Harris and his mates in Chicago in 1905.

And we continue to contribute our skills to change the world. Yes ... we can ... and we have.

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And so it is that a year or so ago we at RCMM decided that it would a good idea to encourage members to bring projects to the table ... a bottom up process ... that is ... to quote an article by RI Director Elect Jessie Harman from Ballarat

"to **Grow Rotary**, we need engaged members in member-centric clubs. We need to ensure that all our members feel welcome and involved, and that they are enjoying their Rotary experience. Most importantly, we need to build our clubs around our members, rather than trying to make our members fit our clubs."

Today, people <u>are</u> looking for fulfilment according to their own needs. It can be cultivating friendships, doing something different to their daily routine, sharing their skills and knowledge with others or simply volunteering as a way to forget about their troubles for a while.

Which ever way ... people seek to enhance their lives ... it is a safe bet that Rotary can provide most of what they seek.

We're just beginning the Covid-19 vaccinations throughout Australia.

Rotary has been vaccinating children all around the world in some of the worst hot spots and war zones. Starting in 1979, Rotary set out to rid the world of Polio. And we've got just ... that far to go.

We are A-political and A-religious.

Is it any wonder that Rotary is often the first on the scene around the world. Because ... <u>Rotary</u> is a world-wide trusted organisation. **Rotary helped to Charter the United Nations, for heaven's sake.**

With women being welcomed into Rotary Clubs around the world, there are today well over 200,000 female Rotarians, working alongside their male club members, to serve their community. The current International President-Elect is Jennifer Jones, who will be the first woman to lead the organisation when she becomes RI President in 2022/23.

In preparation for this I Googled "Reasons To Join Rotary" and stumbled on a newsletter from RC Geelong East, which had a YouTube talk by a bloke called **Patrick Galvin**. He is an eloquent speaker, almost evangelical ... and so he put it across very well, but ...

<u>He</u> said ... that instead of appealing to people's <u>altruistic</u> feelings about volunteering, we should simply appeal to their <u>selfish reasons</u>.

Which ties in wonderfully to what I wrote in my recent contribution to our own Bulletin ... thank you Byron.

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<u>My</u> reasons for accepting an invitation to join Rotary were simple, and possibly, though it might sound contradictory, of a selfish nature. Every day we are asked to contribute to one organisation or another and for years I had resisted with such excuses as "where's the money going?" - "how much is going to admin?" There came a time, however, when I began to realize that by just a simple accident of birth I happen to be living amongst some of the luckier people on this earth.

I was grateful that I could now give some of my time "to serve others through Rotary" and in doing so relieve my conscience!

In his YouTube video - Patrick Galvin went on to say:

Would you be interested in a medicine that reduces stress, increases happiness and makes you live longer?

What if I told you that medicine is free and that there are no negative side effects? The medicine that I'm talking about is not packaged as a pill, powder or potion. Rather it's delivered to your body and mind through your service to others.

And he further outlined_the clear and compelling evidence that points to the physical and mental benefits of being of service to others.

Health, Longevity, Tranquillity, Friendship, Happiness

And so ... in short ... Volunteering makes you happy!!!!!!

But what about the annual fees, I hear you say?

You pay \$300 a year to volunteer?!!!!!!

It's easy to counter that.

I simply say that a proportion of that goes to The Rotary Foundation and it is my way of clearing my conscience.

And when we get one of those 'phone calls at dinner time, Chris and I simply say:

"No, sorry, we give through Rotary."

In the past 100 years, The Rotary Foundation has given away \$3 billion on life-changing, sustainable projects.

So here we are ... a club of 41 members ... down from 45 this time last year.

But it's not all doom and gloom ... we are a very healthy club ... with lots going on for members to get involved in.

But the more members we have ... and the more diverse our skills are ... the more we can do.

And finally ...

I would point out that my own record of sponsoring new members in 40 years has been woeful. But I would always seem to get hung up by the process and protocols that were instilled from my early years.

People would baulk at the annual fee ... the attendance rules used to be onerous ... etc, etc.

So I'm suggesting that we all go out there, talk to people, and tell them:

Volunteering makes you happy!


